
Blessing of the Animals October 4, 4:00 p.m.

Worship Through Giving

The duty of all Christians is to follow Christ; to come together week by week for corporate worship; and to work, pray, and give for the spread of the kingdom of God. (The Catechism, The Book of Common Prayer, p. 856)

Some might say, "What an order, who could possibly do that?". Given the lifestyle of so many in this day and time it may seem impossible, particularly the coming together week by week for worship. It is just not realistic in this day and time. I suggest that just the opposite is true. This in fact sets the bar pretty low. It is the bare minimum that is expected, even demanded of Christian folk. The problem is that we look at it the wrong way. We see such statements as a goal to reach, rather than a starting block. We are to follow Christ. If not Christ then who, ourselves? That is sure to lead us nowhere. To work, pray and give for the spread of God's kingdom; if not God's, then who's kingdom shall we work for, our own? And to come together for worship every week. Is that all? Only once? There are 168 hours in every week. Worship takes 1 or 2 including travel time. We spend more time eating, showering and playing with the cat than we do coming together for worship. But does it have to be that way?

Let's look at it differently. Consider what it means to worship through giving. That could mean that anytime we give of ourselves to the work of God we are engaging in a form of worship. Every time we choose to commit of our time, our abilities, our resources to the doing of God's will for our lives we are participating in worship. That means that every act, every day, every year of our lives is lived in acknowledging



"Free The Girls" is a 501(c) (3) non-profit organization that provides job opportunities to survivors of sex trafficking in developing countries by helping them establish their own businesses selling bras in the second-hand clothing markets. Through the collection of bras in Western countries, "Free The Girls" inspires people and organizations to get involved in the fight against modern day slavery. There are a number of amazing organizations that are helping to rescue these women out of a life of prostitution in Mozambique, Uganda and El Salvador, but what happens after they are rescued? "Free The Girls" currently partners with established aftercare facilities in Mozambique, Uganda and El Salvador to help provide job opportunities to survivors of sex trafficking selling bras.

The organization has a national presence and has been covered by CNN.

Bras? Yes! We are holding a bra drive to collect bras lingering in the back of your lingerie drawer to "Free The Girls". Please bring your used bras to McArthur Hall beginning Sunday, October 4 and every Sunday during October (or during the month) and place them in the box provided. At the end of October they will be shipped to "Free the Girls" Headquarters.
